A Message from Edette Gagné

This is a very special concert on many levels. We honour and celebrate the 2SLGBTQIA+ community by sharing incredible music composed and arranged by members of the Queer community, and by sharing the words, emotions and history that are part of the community's humanity.

Historically, we know that some composers were very open about being Queer. Benjamin Britten wrote songs for his life partner, Sir Peter Pears. Poulenc was one of the first openly gay composers, who inscribed a copy of his Concert champêtre to Richard Chanlaire: the "sunshine of his thirty years." Cole Porter married, but his wife did not mind her husband being gay - as long as he was discreet. Barber made no effort to keep his homosexuality out of explicit view, nor did his life partner composer Gian Carlo Menotti. Leonard Bernstein - who attended the Curtis Institute with Barber and Menotti was openly gay, though he married an actress to satisfy the orchestra then conservative boards employed him as a music director.

Historically, some were not... Tchaikovsky was gay at a time that it was illegal in Russia - his disastrous marriage was meant to quell the rumours about his love life. Saint-Saëns lived similarly; however, his post-marriage life featured soirées where he often performed in drag. Corelli and Handel moved in the same sexually-fluid circles. Lully was known for embarking on affairs with both men and women. Copland was fiercely private, but openly traveled with men and had an intimate relationship with the artist Prentiss Taylor, as revealed in unearthed letters.

We are fortunate to live in a time and place where people can safely and legally choose to identify themselves as Queer. There are still many, many places where Shane Raman could not have dedicated "Love Partakes of the Soul Itself" to Adam Dickson and have it premiered at their wedding.

The group of pieces after intermission deserves to be explored here. In the words of the composer, "Can You Hear Me?" was written as a song lyric exploring the coming out process. The intent is to unpack the feelings of mixed anxiety and hope inherent in the attempt to understand and express oneself fully at this vulnerable time. Rather

than making an explicitly queer statement, the song offers an invitation to understanding which is open to anyone who has ever felt isolated, misunderstood, or both hopeful about and frightened of love.

"The Letter" is the final movement from "I am like many." The larger work, in the composer's words, [was] the result of a unique commission from Senate House Library in London, which tasked [him] with setting something from their current exhibition of queer texts. Upon perusing their materials, it seemed to [him] that everything centred around a single moment in time: the Parliamentary debates on the Wolfenden Report in 1958, representing the first significant (if initially unsuccessful) steps towards the legalization of homosexuality in Britain. The opening solo's poignant words are "People have no idea of the life we live, the life of fear and dread."

I am ever hopeful for humanity. Hopeful that "Somewhere" there's a place for all of us - to be and to love, because we are all beautifully human and *love is love*. I believe that we will come to a day where we can confidently show our "True Colors" - living authentically and embracing all of who we are.

Our concert ends with a celebration of some of the gay icons of the pop world - because what would a show like this be without including Cyndi Lauper, Sir Elton John and Freddie Mercury? Our closing number might be new to some of our younger audience members... unless you are part of the Queer community, in which case it is one of our favourite "anthems".

Far beyond identifying as Queer, what these historic and living composers share is a deep gift for creating music that can touch our hearts. The music we are performing for you is achingly beautiful and brilliantly crafted. Vivaldi Chamber Choir is honoured to perform works by eight living, openly queer composers, including Two-Spirit composer Linthicum-Blackhorse, and we are thrilled to have some of our featured composers in the audience tonight.

We look forward to celebrating another part of our collective humanity on June 15th when we will perform and entire concert of Argentinian music. Hope you can join us for ¡Cantamos! here at Pacific Spirit United Church.
